TWO ORTHOPEDIC SURGICAL SUITES

Funded by Dr. Yusufj



Through a most generous gift from **Dr. Feroze Yusufji** (pictured left), the total renovation of 2 surgical suites for orthopedic surgery is underway at CMCH. There had been no improvements in those suites since they were first constructed in 1980, almost half a century ago. The project includes these upgrades and purchases of new equipment:

- Central Air-conditioning exclusive for Orthopaedic theatres
- Medial grade flooring
- Steel paneled ceiling
- New Wash Basins with proper drainage
- Operating Light KLS Martin
- Image Intensifier Allengers
- Tourniquet system Zimmer

Dr. Yusufji has had a long career as orthopedic surgeon here in the United States working in the Atlanta, Georgia area. He recalls his experiences at CMC:

Ijoined CMCL as a medical student in 1958. I had originally wanted to become either a cardio vascular surgeon or a neurosurgeon

so I start Residency training in general surgery. My first rotation was in Orthopedics and Dr. Eggleston in General Surgery, Dr. Ronald Garst in orthopedics were dynamic teachers and surgeons. One patient I treated was a 14-year old girl from Saharanpur with severe post-polio paralysis and she couldn't even get up. Over a course of 6 months I did multiple procedures on her and sent her

home walking with braces and crutches and, of course, after that experience I could only think of orthopedics. I went through the requisite training and did my M.S. in orthopedics in 1967, being the 2nd person at CMCL to do this. After two years I left for the USA to undertake a full residency in orthopedics and started practice in 1974.

He gives his reasons for making this donation:

Orthopedic surgery at CMC was a leading center for the northern part of India. Patients came from far and wide to be treated for problems which greatly enhanced training. There was a collegial atmosphere between the faculty and trainees making it a pleasure to be there. Dr. Garst, professor and head of department, along with Dr. Lionel H. Loho, kept

the department well furnished with the latest equipment.

His initial idea was to endow a chair at the hospital however,

"Dr. Bobby John, current head of orthopedics, suggested renovating the orthopedic operating suites instead. My wife and I decided to fund the renovation adding the requirement to retain some of the senior faculty. The project is about 50% done as of mid-December and I hope many of the alumni will take by similar projects to help our old Alma Mater."

As we are closing out the year 2020, I would like to take this opportunity to report some of the key accomplishments of the Ludhiana CMC(LCMC) Board. USA. Despite the horribly destructive international impact of Covid-19, Ludhiana's population was not impacted that badly. Yet CMC took a large load of patients infected with the Covid. Patients who were turned away by the private hospitals found their way to CMC Hospital. As a result the

hospital critical care facilities had to be expanded several fold. A Corona isolation ward was created and most of the ICU space had to be Isolated for the critically ill patients requiring ventilatory support. There was also a need for the Personal

Protective Equipment (PPE). These events required major unexpected expenses for which CMC hospital had very limited reserve funds. Consequently the Director of CMCH appealed to the US Board to send them Funds which the board took out from its reserve funds to care for the critically ill patients. We donated Over \$100,000 which allowed purchase of a couple of new Ventilators and the critically needed and costly PPE.

Nearly 50 plus staff members developed Covid which was managed successfully.

Once again this created financial strain as the CMC staff members received free medical care.

The Covid situation at present is under control but the necessary funds for PPE continue to be a serious financial problem. Moreover the Covid affected patient numbers continue to periodically rise in waves and strain the delicate finances of the hospital.

essential support in developing the new subspeciality services.

During this past year, we provided support to install a hospitalwide Information management system(HIMS) which is nearly complete with a major commitment of \$200,000 from our board. This will bring all medical information on line and aid in keeping better track of patient information, online lab reporting and better financial management. We are short by \$50,000 and seek donors to help pay off the outstanding bills.

New Renovations are underway with funding to upgrade the Orthopedic Operation Theatres (Donation of \$100,000 courtesy of Dr Feroze Yusufji, one of our senior board members.). Two additional upgrades are presently under discussion. The Eye department has an old slit lamp which is in need of an upgrade with a cost of about \$50,000. Dr Gurpal Bhuller, our very energetic board member has volunteered to raise funds to start a screening Program for Diabetic Retinopathy, a common cause of blindness in Punjab. CMCH is also ready to start a training program in the Vitreo-Retinal Surgery service but the hospital lacks equipment which will cost over \$150,000. Lastly the Neonatology unit at CMCH

> provides service to a large number of prematurely born babies which requires a functional system of monitors and ventilators with a cost of nearly \$150,000. This unit will be upgraded with partial funding from a sizable gift left by one of our senior Alumni (late Dr Bhagwant Gill). The medical class of 1971 has teamed up to raise funds to provide one ventilator for the NICU(Neonatal ICU). The Ventilator costs range from \$20,000 to \$30, 000 per unit.

> As you can sense by reading my report,

I am sending out an appeal to all CMC alumni to give a year-end gift of \$1,000 or more, which will go a long way to help our upgrade efforts for the various departments at the CMC Hospital.

This is a small price to pay to remember and support your alma mater which gave us invaluable education resulting in successful careers in the US. Let us continue to be grateful for the gift of education which is so much bigger than the donations requested from all of us who benefited so very much.

Along with your financial support the US Board welcomes new board members who are enthusiastic to serve as many of you are heading into retirement.

BOARD MEMBER PROFILE DOROTHY M. BARBO, M.D.



Dr. Dorothy Barbo, long-time Board member, was born and raised in Wisconsin. She received a B.A. from Asbury University in Kentucky and an M.D. from the University of Wisconsin in Madison. After completing a residency in Ob-Gyn she did a fellowship I Gyn Oncology at Marquette University in Milwaukee. In 1968 she joined the Board of Global Missions of the United Methodist Church and was appointed to serve at the Christian Medical College in Ludhiana. There she served on the faculty in the department of Ob-Gyn teaching and with a large practice in gynecology and gyn

cancer. In 1972 she returned to the USA and took a position as Professor at the Medical College of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. There she established one of the early centers for mature women's health. In 1991 she was recruited to the University of New Mexico School of Medicine as professor and was active in the state cancer program. Since retiring from the University in 2000 as Professor Emerita she has traveled and continue teaching in multiple countries in Africa and Asia with the Christian Medical and Dental Associations (CMDA). For 65 years she has been active in CMDA and served a national predient 1997-99. She was elected to the Board of the Ludhiana Christian Medical College USA in 1983 and served a president from 2005-2012. Her heart remains in education and training for India. She has a passion for great Indian tea and an extensive collection of tea caddy spoons, accessories and books.

PROJECTS TO CONSIDER

In preparing information for this newsletter I was fortunate to receive from Dr. Bhatti, Director of the hospital, an extensive list of projects most of which would benefit from donations and funding. There may be something on this list which is of particular interest to you. If you are or a group, friends or maybe a church group, would like to be funders for one of these please let us know. Here is a partial list of those projects:

OBSTETRICS AND GYNECOLOGY

- 1. Office Hysteroscopy setup which is required for daycare diagnostic facility in women with gynecological abnormalities
- 2. Procure endoscopic surgical instruments for hysteroscopic surgeries
- 3. Extend infertility workup service facilities and build a State of Art Unit for Assisted Reproductive technology to provide low-cost ART which will look after the needs of childless couples who cannot afford treatment from private IVF centers.
- 4. An Embryology and Andrology laboratory to facilitate treatment to couples with infertility.
- 5. A Urogynecology Unit with a facility for Urodynamic studies and advanced surgical treatments for urological problems in the women
- 6. Fetal Medicine Unit with adequate laboratory screening facility for providing antenatal detection and prevention of fetal aneuploidy and anomalies
- 7. An Obstetrics and Gynecology Ultrasonography Unit for diagnostic and interventional procedures like Uterine Artery Embolization for mothers with postpartum

hemorrhage, uterine fibroids, adenomyosis, and gynecological diseases.

BURN UNIT

- 1. An Intensive Air-Conditioned Care Burn Unit near the ward with at least four beds well equipped with laminar flow with HEPA filters, patient warming system, and ventilators
- 2. An operation theatre complex near Burn unit exclusively for burn patients with at least two separate operation theatres where all operations relating to burn patients can be carried out

DEPARTMENT OF MEDICINE

- 1. Defibrillator and Ultrasound Machine for the High Dependency Unit
- 2. Infrastructure improvements at the Medicine Department Complex and ICU
- 3. Antiretroviral Therapy (ART) Centre in the hospital.
- 4. Hematology
- 5. Establishing of a Center of Excellence in Hematology and Immunology for patient care and research
- 6. Establishing a Molecular Laboratory to support diagnosis

EYE SURGERY PROJECT

Earlier in the fall we received a proposal from the hospital to fund the equipment necessary to diagnose and treat diabetic patients who develop diabetic retinopathy. In early December a Memorandum of Understanding was signed by the hospital and the Board promising \$150,000 in funding to support the purchase of equipment as well as eye camps.

Dr. Gurpal Bhuller, member of the Board, has visited India frequently to conduct eye camps. He has maintained close ties with physicians at CMC. We had begun a fund raising project under Dr. Bhuller's leadership to obtain the funding needed for this project. Discussion of the current project evoked memories with the board members who had trained under or had heard about Dr. Victor Rambo who was a legendary eye surgeon at Ludhiana CMC. Perhaps you are among those who went on those camps. A biography of Dr. Rambo describes how he began the eye camps which are still being routinely held around Ludhiana in the Punjab.

One day an idea came to [Dr. Rambo]. Why not hold eye "camps" in the villages, where the people were? Dr. Rambo's team worked out a system. An advance man went to a village to advertise the camp. On the set day, the eye team arrived and cleaned out the school or church or factory where the surgery would take place. The eye team examined the patients to see who had cataracts or other eye diseases and tagged them to show what should be done. Sometimes Dr. Rambo tap-danced (on a table) to make people laugh and ease their fear of the knife. Then surgeries began. Often they would last until late at night. (www.mmhof.org/bios/rambo.html)

The surgery in the Eye Camps in those early days was done without any lens implants. The Eye Camps at present do not involve surgery, and patients who need surgery are brought back to CMC for the operation.

UPDATE ON HIMS

As reported in the May 2020 Review work on installing the Hospital Information Management System (HIMS) was delayed by the onset of the Corona Virus pandemic. However, encouraging news from Ludhiana indicates that work is continuing although no "go live" date is forecasted at the moment. The needed servers to distribute the system throughout the hospital are in place and the software vendor was able to remotely install the system and the customizations that were required. The December 15 report says:

The team from Sofscript arrived in the first week of December. The following activities were undertaken since:

- 1. Gap analysis
- 2. Customization
- 3. Getting the infrastructure ready viz., servers, network and clients
- 4. Installation of the software on our servers
- 5. Planning for the integration with the HRMS (Human Resources Management System)

They plan tentatively to launch the key user training from the first week of January. Planned date for launch should be latest by end of January 2021 or early Feb 2021.

We have supported the HIMS project with \$100,000 to this point. This system will support improved patient and case management as well as facilitate all aspects of billing and record keeping. There is always need for more donations in
